## **Position purpose**

A Level B academic is expected to make significant contributions to the teaching effort of a department, school, faculty or other organisational unit or an interdisciplinary area. An academic at this level is expected to carry out activities to maintain and develop her/his scholarly, research and/or professional activities relevant to the profession or discipline.

The Level B academic will contribute to teaching in the undergraduate and postgraduate programs of French Studies, engage in curriculum development, pursue innovative teaching practices, particularly focussing on integrating Information and Communication Technologies, and maintain an active program of research.

**Reporting Line:** The position reports to the Head of School, through the relevant performance manager

#### **Key responsibilities**

- 1. Collaborate with other staff in course coordination, development of course materials and curriculum, especially at Beginners and Intermediate levels
- 2. Develop teaching resources and teaching innovations
- 3. Review and deliver lectures, tutorials, seminars, workshops, student field excursions or study tours, studio sessions / podcasts / webinars, all with a view to implementing strategies designed to improve outcomes for students
- 4. Coordinate Units (acting as a unit coordinator and offering guidance to assistant lecturers and supervision of sessional staff in teaching unit/s if required), or course modules and lead team-teaching activities with other staff (as appropriate to the discipline)
- 5. Foster and promote learning environments that are flexible, student-centred and accessible, utilising appropriate technology
- 6. Play an active role in education and pedagogy at program, School, Faculty and University level
- 7. Support the development of excellence in education in line with School, Faculty and University policy
- 8. Participate in the dissemination of best practice in language and discipline-specific pedagogical practices
- 9. Collaborate in the development of quality projects which explore, test, practice and communicate improved pedagogies and innovations in teaching / program delivery
- 10. Supervise Honours and postgraduate students
- 11. Undertake original research that will lead to publications in refereed journals or with high level academic or commercial publishers
- 12. Develop research projects that are suitable for external and government funding
- 13. Participate actively in and contribute to the collaborative research culture of the program and school
- 14. Participate in School and university consultative processes and procedures including school and faculty/university meetings and committees as expected

#### Key selection criteria

#### **Education/Qualifications**

- 1. The appointee will have:
  - A PhD in a relevant area within French Studies; or

• qualifications, expertise and demonstrated experience in areas that directly facilitate innovations in course development and delivery

#### Knowledge and Skills

- 2. Demonstrated record of teaching excellence and curriculum development, in particular for Beginners and Intermediate levels
- Demonstrated expertise in aspects of teaching / learning French as a foreign language, such as the development of technology-enhanced language learning environments, with demonstrated outcomes
- 4. Evidence of potential to make strong research contributions in a relevant area within French Studies
- 5. Advanced computer literacy and demonstrated capacity to test, pilot, and integrate Information and Communication Technologies in language learning curriculum
- 6. Native or near-native command of written and spoken French and English
- 7. Demonstrated high level of interpersonal skills and demonstrated ability to work independently and as part of a team in a collegiate manner
- 8. Excellent planning and organisational skills, including the ability to prioritise multiple tasks and meet deadlines
- 9. Experience in the higher education sector and knowledge of the structure and operations of a university learning, teaching and research faculty/school/department
