- Consultation with students
- Preparation and assessment of student assignments and examinations
- Supervision of honours and postgraduate students
- Involvement in professional activity
- Marking and assessment of student assignments and examinations

Research

- Undertake original research that will lead to publications in refereed journals or with high level academic or commercial publishers
- Development of research projects that are suitable for external and government funding
- Participate actively in and contribute to the collaborative research culture of the program and school

• To be involved in professional and community activities and the performance of other duties as required by the Head of the School

Key Selection Criteria

Essential:

- 1. A PhD in Criminology or cognate discipline
- 2. Demonstrated ability to make a significant contribution to teaching and learning outcomes in the Criminology undergraduate program
- 3. An excellent track record of achievement in research, including publications and competitive grant applications
- 4. Demonstrated ability to supervise research students
- 5. Demonstrated capacity to work collaboratively with colleagues

Desirable:

- 6. Demonstrated ability to teach into our core criminology units including our first year courses
- 7. Demonstrated ability to coordinate a large undergraduate unit and manage sessional staff
- 8. Demonstrated history of excellence in teaching through documented teaching evaluations by peers and/or students
- 9. Research expertise that aligns with the strengths of Criminology at Monash
- Demonstrated ability to contribute to attract competitive grant funding and produce high quality publications
- 11. Demonstrated ability to develop and work effectively in research teams.
- 12. Demonstrated ability to contribute to service roles in the school

13. Strong commitment to collegiality and building Criminology at Monash
