Position Summary

The School of Historical and Philosophical Studies (SHAPS), which is a part of the Faculty of Arts, was formed in 2011 comprising the programs of History, History and Philosophy of Science, Philosophy, Classics and Archaeology, The Grimwade Centre for Cultural Materials Conservation, and The Program in Jewish Culture & Society, SHAPS teaches a wide range of subjects across these disciplines and has a large Honours and Postgraduate cohort, and also receives a high level of nationally competitive research grants. This position resides within the History department and reports to the Head of School in SHAPS.

This position is funded via the Hansen Trust, which has been established, in perpetuity, to transform the teaching of History at the University of Melbourne. It aims to develop and instil a passion for History within students and the broader community, to deepen student engagement with their learning, to emphasise the importance of this field of study, and to support a range of initiatives in the Faculty of Arts to build excellence and innovation in teaching and learning programs. The Hansen Lecturer will be a History specialist in some area of Asian history since 1500, with suitable research, language capability, a capacity for teaching excellence and a commitment to and enthusiasm for the university teaching of History. Preference may be given to applicants with expertise in north-east Asian or Vietnamese history and more broadly to areas that will complement existing Asian history capacity. The appointee will work to develop new areas of teaching, research and research training as well as support existing programs.

The Hansen Lecturer in Asian History will be responsible for teaching at both the undergraduate and graduate levels and will assist in the development of new subjects and re-development of existing subjects as appropriate; capacity to supervise Research Higher Degree students is also a requirement. The appointee will undertake research resulting in publications with leading publishers in the field, and apply for competitive research grants, foster engagement links with external networks/partners nationally and internationally and will take on administrative tasks associated with the appointment and as assigned by the discipline and school.

1. Key Responsibilities

A Lecturer (Level B) is expected to make contributions to the teaching effort of the institution and to carry out activities to maintain and develop his/her scholarly, research and professional activities relevant to the profession or discipline. Specific duties include:

1.1 TEACHING

- Preparation and delivery of lectures, tutorials and seminars as appropriate and in line with Faculty of Arts minimum thresholds for teaching satisfaction
- Initiation, development and review of subject material;
- Curriculum development;
- Consultation with students;
- Marking and assessment;
- Administrative tasks associated with the subjects taught;
- Subject coordination including the supervision of sessional tutors;

Supervision of honours students, postgraduate coursework and postgraduate research students as required;

1.2 RESEARCH

- Publications arising from scholarship and research in line with Faculty of Arts minimum expectations;
- Application for external competitive research funding;
- Participation in the research activities of the discipline;
- Active participation in research seminars, and national and international conferences;
- Contribute to developing networks within the discipline and with other universities, institutions and communities, both nationally and internationally, to support collaboration.

1.3 SERVICE TO THE DISCIPLINE & SCHOOL

- Involvement in professional activity, including participation in meetings of professional societies;
- Engagement with external stakeholders including building external networks, partnerships and consultancies;
- Meetings and committee work within the School and the wider university community, as appropriate;
- Undertake administrative activities commensurate for a Level B academic.

2. Selection Criteria

2.1 ESSENTIAL

- A PhD in history or related field;
- A strong record in research with a developing publication profile in Asian history;
- Fluency in a relevant Asian language;
- Capacity to attract research grants and consultancies;
- Demonstrated ability for and commitment to excellence in teaching, including the capacity to initiate and execute subject development;
- Capacity to supervise honours, postgraduate coursework and research higher degree theses;
- A capacity to teach large classes on modern (including twentieth-century) Asian history and contribute as appropriate to world history subjects.

2.2 DESIRABLE

- Research specialisation in northeast Asian or Vietnamese history since 1500, or in an area of Asian history that will complement existing Asian history capacity;
- A record of excellence in university History teaching.
- Capacity to undertake multidisciplinary and collaborative research;
- Strong computer literacy in line with the University's commitment to eTeaching and eLearning;
- Experience in community engagement with a capacity to build local and international networks and partnerships.

3. Special Requirements

- Shortlisted candidates will either be invited to the University or invited to connect via video link to participate in a formal panel interview as well as present a seminar relating to any aspect of their current research. They will also be expected to submit a short statement about their approach to university History teaching, including how they could contribute to the fulfilment of the objectives of The Hansen Trust, and briefly outlining some ideas about their future teaching in the program. The objectives of The Hansen Trust are:
- To position History at the University of Melbourne at the forefront of innovation in tertiary teaching and learning
- To provide students at the University of Melbourne with an outstanding education in History and a strong sense of the lifelong value and relevance of the discipline
- To nurture the passion for history that exists within the broader community, and to increase the public visibility of the discipline of History and related areas of History within the School of Historical and Philosophical Studies at the University of Melbourne.
