Position Summary

The University of Melbourne Centre for Cancer Research (UMCCR) has the mission to improve cancer patient outcome through Cancer Genome Discovery, Translation and Personalized Medicine. We seek to recruit a Senior Research Software Engineer to work in close collaboration with the Global Alliance for Genomics and Health (GA4GH) and the Australian Genomics Health Alliance (AGHA) to plan, develop and implement a modern genomics data analysis, management and dissemination environment. We expect having to scale our data manipulation and management systems to match the increasing volumes of biomedical data, providing a challenging and rewarding environment for the appropriate applicant.

Working with colleagues at UMCCR and partners at national and commercial HPC environments the Senior Research Software Engineer will explore federated solutions to track, distribute and analyse large genomic data sets. Experience with cancer genomics is not necessary, but a strong background in software development is. The incumbent will be supporting the analysis of genomic data at scale and should be comfortable developing software for distributed systems.

1. Key Responsibilities

The Senior Research Software engineer will help UMCCR disseminate genomics data generated in clinical settings, grow the Centre's role in applied genomics in an international setting, and support global initiatives in open data sharing and processing. The incumbent will:

- Collaborate with GA4GH partners on developing cutting edge data and software distribution methods
- Drive developments in large scale data processing, virtualization and cloud-based system deployment
- Plan computational strategies to optimally support the Centre's accredited sequencing service
- Mentor junior staff on topics of software development and bioinformatics
- Advice UMCCR and UoM leadership on current state of computational requirements for high throughput genomics and future requirements.

The engineer will work closely with international collaborators on all these aspects. The position will also serve as an interface between international initiatives and national consortia such as the Australian Genomics Health Alliance to ensure rapid deployment and dissemination of developed solutions. Based on prior experience the position will also guide the future direction of UMCCR research computing and resource allocation.

2. Selection Criteria

2.1 ESSENTIAL

- MSc degree in Computer Science or related discipline with 8+ years of experience in software development or an equivalent combination of relevant experience and education in software development with a minimum of 5 years' experience.
- Fluency in more than one programming language
- Expert knowledge of at least one major UNIX platform

- Extensive experience with modern software development approaches and continuous integration testing
- Experience with commercial cloud environments
- Evidence of mentorship or staff supervision
- Excellent time management skills and project planning skills
- Effective communication and stakeholder management ability

2.2 DESIRABLE

- Experience with genomics and next-generation sequencing data analysis
- Expertise in Apache Hadoop, Apache Spark, or other data processing frameworks
- Familiarity working with remote teams and collaborators in different time zones
- Contributions to existing or own open source projects
- Contribution to community events (Hackathons, Codefests, etc.)

2.3 SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS

The incumbent may be required to contribute to the Centre's activities out-of-hours.

3. Job Complexity, Skills, Knowledge

3.1 LEVEL OF SUPERVISION / INDEPENDENCE

The Senior Research Engineer is expected to operate with considerable autonomy. The incumbent needs to be self-motivated to stay informed about current best practices and likely future developments in software development, sequencing workflows and computational environments. They will independently engage with their peers at national and international sites such as GA4GH, The Broad Institute and other academic and commercial partners to decide and develop technical solutions for sharing genomic data generated at UMCCR. The Senior Research Engineer will independently:

- 1. Make strategic decisions on software development directions
- 2. Evaluate novel technologies and their suitability for the Centre's mission
- 3. Coordinate decisions on software and hardware purchases
- 4. Decide on future technology developments and resource allocation

They will also guide UMCCR bioinformaticians, junior developers, and research computing staff at UoM and NCI on best practices in software development.

3.2 PROBLEM SOLVING AND JUDGEMENT

The incumbent needs to be able to identify technical bottlenecks and hurdles in software development to allow UMCCR to share and analyze genomics data at scale. They will need to rapidly develop and evaluate software prototypes, deciding which implementations are most

suitable for the Centre's requirements, and test developed solutions in coordination with other international cancer centres. They will synthesize feedback and use the gained knowledge to inform future software development directions. Excellent time management skills and project planning skills are required to ensure software development focuses on the most urgent tasks.

3.3 PROFESSIONAL AND ORGANISATIONAL KNOWLEDGE

The position is expected to have a thorough understanding of best practices in modern software development along with familiarity with both traditional HPC and cloud computing environments. The incumbent will coordinate the development of software for data sharing and analysis with international partners at The Broad Institute (Boston), CRG (Barcelona), UCSC (Santa Cruz) and other open source projects as well as consortia such as the Global Alliance for Genomics and Health. They will interact with peers at national research computing environments to optimize deployed software solutions, and inform UMCCR leadership of identified problems and best ways to resolve them.

3.4 RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

The position will provide guidance on resource allocations of UMCCR funds for software development and operation. They will develop resource plans and work on cost/benefits analysis with peers at UoM, NCI and commercial partners. The incumbent will also independently assess commercial solutions for their suitability and make recommendations to UMCCR and UoM.

3.5 BREADTH OF THE POSITION

Having the capacity to reliably sequence the genomes of cancer patients and integrating the information with the plethora of public cancer genome data is key for the success of UMCCR. The position will make vital decisions on software development and use their expertise in collaboration with national and international partners to implement and deploy these solutions at UMCCR and nationally. The incumbent will engage with initiatives such as GA4GH, driving projects to standardize UMCCR's genomics efforts and aligning them with international best practices.
