## ***Position Summary***

The Lecturer in Criminology (Level B) will be a committed, engaging teacher and researcher with specific expertise in one or more of the following areas: race and crime, gender and crime, crime and settler societies *or* whose work complements the existing Criminology profile at the University of Melbourne. The successful candidate will be responsible for teaching at both the undergraduate and graduate levels and will assist in the development of new subjects as appropriate; supervision of RHD students is also a requirement. The successful candidate will be expected to make a significant contribution to the research reputation of the Criminology discipline in the School specifically and of the Faculty of Arts more generally and will also undertake research resulting in publications with leading publishers in the field. The successful candidate will foster engagement links with external networks/partners nationally and internationally and will take on administrative tasks associated with the appointment.

### ***1. Key Responsibilities***

A Lecturer (Level B) is expected to make contributions to the teaching effort of the institution and to carry out activities to maintain and develop his/her scholarly, research, and/or professional activities relevant to the profession or discipline. Specific duties include:

#### **1.1 TEACHING**

- ▶ Preparation and delivery of lectures, tutorials and seminars as appropriate and in line with Faculty of Arts minimum thresholds for teaching satisfaction;
- ▶ Initiation, development and review of subject material;
- ▶ Curriculum development;
- ▶ Consultation with students;
- ▶ Marking and assessment;
- ▶ Administrative tasks associated with the subjects taught;
- ▶ Subject coordination including supervision of sessional tutors;
- ▶ Supervision of honours students and postgraduate research students as required;
- ▶ Demonstrate a mean score of 3.4 out of 5 for the 'Student Evaluation Scores – Survey'.

#### **1.2 RESEARCH**

- ▶ Publications arising from scholarship and research in line with Faculty of Arts minimum expectations;
- ▶ Application for external competitive research funding;
- ▶ Participation in the research activities of the discipline;
- ▶ Active participation in research seminars, and national and international conferences;
- ▶ Contribute to developing networks within the discipline and with other universities, institutions and communities, both nationally and internationally.

#### **1.3 SERVICE TO THE DISCIPLINE & SCHOOL**

- ▶ Involvement in professional activity, including participation in meetings of professional societies;

- ▶ Engagement with external stakeholders including building external networks, partnerships and consultancies;
- ▶ Meetings and committee work within the School and the wider university community, as appropriate;
- ▶ Undertake administrative activities commensurate for a Level B academic.

- ▶ A completed PhD in Criminology or closely allied discipline;
- ▶ Demonstrated specialisation in one or more of the following: race and crime, gender and crime, crime and settler societies *or* work which complements the existing Criminology profile at the University of Melbourne;
- ▶ A strong record in research with a developing publication profile in high profile criminology journals;
- ▶ Capacity to attract research grants and consultancies;
- ▶ Demonstrated ability for excellence in teaching including the capacity to initiate course development;
- ▶ Capacity to teach high enrolment undergraduate subjects;
- ▶ Ability to teach across a broad range of Criminology subjects;
- ▶ Ability to supervise honours and postgraduate coursework degree theses;
- ▶ Community engagement with a capacity to build local and international networks and partnerships.

### 2.2 DESIRABLE

- ▶ Capacity for multidisciplinary and collaborative research;
- ▶ Strong computer literacy in line with the University's commitment to eTeaching and eLearning.
