## **Position Summary**

The School of Languages and Linguistics teaches a broad suite of undergraduate and graduate courses, maintains a vigorous research higher degree culture and has an internationally-recognised research profile. The School now seeks to appoint a Lecturer (Level B) to fill a 5-year fixed-term position at 0.6 (roughly equivalent to 3 days per week) to consolidate and further develop the School's teaching and research programs.

The position is located in Linguistics & Applied Linguistics, which offers an undergraduate major and minor in Linguistics & Applied Linguistics, as well as a graduate Master of Applied Linguistics, in addition to an Honours program and a large PhD program. The Lecturer will contribute to research in teaching in Linguistics & Applied Linguistics with a focus on Applied Linguistics. A specialisation in an area such as second language learning, discourse analysis, sociolinguistics, and/or World Englishes is preferred.

The successful candidate will be responsible for teaching at both the undergraduate and graduate levels and will assist in the development of new subjects as appropriate; supervision of RHD students is also a requirement. The incumbent will also undertake research resulting in publications with leading publishers in the field, foster engagement links with external networks/partners nationally and internationally and will take on administrative tasks associated with the appointment.

#### 1. Selection Criteria

#### 1.1 ESSENTIAL

- A completed PhD in Applied Linguistics, Linguistics, Second Language Studies, Educational Linguistics or a related discipline
- Demonstrated specialisation in Applied Linguistics
- A strong record in research with a developing publication profile
- Demonstrated ability for excellence in teaching especially at the graduate level
- Demonstrated commitment to eTeaching and eLearning, and capacity to teach online students
- Capacity to attract research grants and consultancies
- Ability to supervise honours and postgraduate coursework degree theses.

#### 1.2 DESIRABLE

- Teaching and research expertise in one or several of the following: discourse studies, second language learning and teaching, World Englishes, sociolinguistics
- Ability to teach English as a Second Language
- Experience in community engagement with a capacity to build local & international networks & partnerships.

### 3. Key Responsibilities

A Lecturer (Level B) is expected to make contributions to the teaching effort of the institution and to carry out activities to maintain and develop his/her scholarly, research, and/or professional activities relevant to the profession or discipline. Specific duties:

#### 3.1 TEACHING

- Demonstrate mean Student Evaluation scores above 3.4 for sole co-ordinated subjects
- Full subject coordination including development of new and ongoing review of subject material at all levels; preparation and delivery of lectures and seminars; marking and assessment; administrative tasks associated with the subjects taught; coordination of student consultations
- Initiation, development and review of subject materials at the undergraduate and postgraduate levels
- Completion of administrative tasks associated with the subjects taught
- Supervision of honours, postgraduate, diploma and masters coursework and research higher students as required
- Undergraduate and postgraduate course design
- Presentation of research workshops/seminars within the School.

#### 3.2 RESEARCH

- Publications arising from scholarship and research (the expectation of academic staff at level B is an average of at least 1.5 DISSR points per annum)
- Application for external competitive research funding
- Participation in the research activities of the discipline
- Active participation in research seminars, and national and international conferences.

#### 3.3 SERVICE TO THE DISCIPLINE & SCHOOL

- Involvement in professional activity, including participation in meetings of professional societies
- Engagement with external stakeholders including building external networks, partnerships and consultancies
- Meetings and committee work within the School and the wider university community, as appropriate
- Undertake administrative activities commensurate for a Level B academic.
