Position Summary

Established in 2014, the Melbourne Poche Centre for Indigenous Health provides training and development for emerging and established Indigenous academic leaders. The Melbourne Poche Centre is a node of the Poche National Network.

The central vision of the Melbourne Poche Centre is to accelerate the development of the Indigenous health workforce through systemic disruption and optimisation, and individualised support, development and opportunity. The two key areas of focus are:

- development of leadership in Indigenous health through fostering the emergence of the next generation of Indigenous leaders, and
- Indigenous PhD recruitment and support.

Both of these areas of activity can be strengthened and informed through increased research activity, and leadership, including in the international context.

This Academic Specialist position (http://www.policy.unimelb.edu.au/schedules/MPF1154-ScheduleD.pdf) provides the opportunity to build on the considerable strengths of an existing team and contribute to the growth of a cohort of early career researchers (including PhD candidates) in a research context, and also apply outstanding skills in leadership, advancement and engagement across a national and international community of practice.

The Academic Specialist will also contribute to a range of discrete Indigenous workforce development projects aligned with the interests of the Melbourne Poche Centre, and will work under the broad direction of the Director of the Poche Centre.

The embedding of the Melbourne Poche Centre within the Faculty of Medicine, Dentistry and Health Science also provides significant opportunity for collaboration across the breadth of the Faculty and University.

Indigenous applicants (including from the international community) are strongly encouraged to apply.

1. Selection Criteria

1.1 ESSENTIAL FOR APPOINTMENT AT LEVEL C

- Ethical scholar who values diversity, and practices in ways which encourage diversity
- Outstanding interpersonal and communication skills, with an ability to build and maintain relationships with key stakeholders (internal and external) and work collaboratively
- Demonstrated successful engagement with Indigenous communities, including the global Indigenous academic community
- PhD or equivalent professional qualification and experience in relevant fields (e.g. Indigenous workforce, higher education, and advancement)
- Excellent research publication track record in national and international peer reviewed journals or an excellent track record in leadership, advancement or engagement with solid research outputs
- Track record of peer-reviewed competitive research grant procurement, or comparable track record in advancement and engagement in Indigenous contexts.
- Evidence of significant contribution to independent and team-based research
- Outstanding oral and written communication skills

1.2 DESIRABLE

- Experience in evaluation of programs including impact measures
- Demonstrated capacity in the leadership of research teams on major research projects or programs

1.3 ADDITIONAL CRITERIA FOR APPOINTMENT AT LEVEL D

- Outstanding and sustained research publication track record in international peer reviewed journals and an excellent track record in leadership, advancement or engagement
- Outstanding evidence of leadership in relevant domains
- Very strong track record of peer-reviewed competitive research grant procurement
- Outstanding evidence of success in advancement and engagement in Indigenous contexts.

1.4 SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS

- All annual leave to be taken during the duration of the contract
- Some national and international travel will be required

- Build competence and confidence of Poche staff in presenting the projects, study methods, analysis and results to academic and industry audiences

- Mentoring of Level A and B staff
- Active participation in key aspects of engagement within and beyond the University

The Faculty of Medicine, Dentistry & Health Sciences has an enviable research record and is the University of Melbourne's largest faculty in terms of management of financial resources, employment of academic and professional staff, teaching of undergraduate and postgraduate (including research higher degree) students and the conduct of basic and applied research.
