Position Summary

The appointee will demonstrate excellence in teaching, learning and scholarship within the discipline of nursing.

Located within the Department of Nursing at The University of Melbourne the appointee will primarily support the delivery of teaching in mental health nursing courses.

The appointee will be required to work directly with the Course Coordinator of the Graduate Diploma in Mental Health Nursing Practice to support the development and delivery of new online teaching in the specialty of mental health nursing as well as supporting on-campus teaching of mental health nursing as required.

1. Key Responsibilities

- Make a significant contribution to the development of curriculum and delivery of educational programs using online modes of delivery in mental health nursing
- Contribute expertise in both mental health knowledge and learning preferences for mental health nursing students
- Demonstrate a proactive reflexive teaching practice through seeking guidance from senior teaching staff and student feedback
- Apply contemporary pedagogical insights to teaching practice, including those specific to the discipline of nursing
- Contribute to the review of learning and teaching materials and quality assurance processes

Contribute to the development of evidence-based practice in nursing in mental health nursing programs

5.1 MELBOURNE SCHOOL OF HEALTH SCIENCES

Established in 2009, the Melbourne School of Heath Sciences is an inter-professional learning community at the forefront of leadership in health sciences education, research, scholarship, professional practice, workforce training and knowledge translation. Our collective focus is on improving health and well-being of people, locally and globally. Our diversity of disciplines and research expertise provides us with unique shared insights into health and wellbeing, impacting on both physical and mental health outcomes across people and their families. Our research has a strong focus on cross-cutting research themes including implementation science, health services research and clinical trial methodology resulting in the integration of findings into improved care of the communities that we serve as well as influencing health policy.

The School comprises the departments of Optometry and Vision Sciences, Nursing, Social Work, Physiotherapy, Audiology and Speech Pathology. It educates approximately 1400 equivalent full-time graduate entry and post-graduate students in each of these disciplines through accredited, and other, programs tailored to workforce needs nationally and internationally. It provides national and international health sciences students with professional training designed to foster their leadership capabilities with a focus on developing workforce ready and research capable graduates.

5.2 NURSING

In July 2009, Nursing became a Department of the School of Health Sciences, in the Faculty of Medicine, Dentistry and Health Sciences. Nursing was established within the Faculty of Medicine, Dentistry and Health Sciences in 1996. The philosophy of nursing at The University of Melbourne is that clinical practice and practice-based research are integral to the educational preparation of all nurses at all levels of professional practice.

From 2008 the qualifying degree in Nursing at The University of Melbourne has been a Master of Nursing Science and is open to graduates from a range of undergraduate degree programs. The School offers a range of specialist postgraduate programs at

Graduate Certificate, Postgraduate Diploma and Masters levels. The research degree program features both Masters and PhD courses which are well recognised for the quality of the research training offered and the strong clinical focus of the nursing research programs. The research foci include cancer care; mental health; infant, child and adolescent health; skin integrity and wound care; and emergency and critical care. 5.3 THE FACULTY OF MEDICINE, DENTISTRY & HEALTH SCIENCES

The Faculty of Medicine, Dentistry & Health Sciences has an enviable research record and is the University of Melbourne's largest faculty in terms of management of financial resources, employment of academic and professional staff, teaching of undergraduate and postgraduate (including research higher degree) students and the conduct of basic and applied research.
