Key responsibilities

Specific duties required of a Level B academic may include:

- 1. The conduct of tutorials, practical classes, demonstrations, workshops, student field excursions, clinical sessions and studio sessions
- 2. Development of course material with appropriate advice from and support of more senior staff
- 3. The initiation and development of subject material
- 4. The preparation and delivery of lectures and seminars
- 5. Supervision of major honours or postgraduate research projects
- Supervision of the program of study of honours students and of postgraduate students engaged in course work
- 7. The conduct of research
- 8. Involvement in professional activity
- 9. Consultation with students
- Broad administrative functions, the majority of which are connected with the subjects in which the academic teaches
- 11. Marking and assessment
- 12. Attendance at departmental, school and/or faculty meetings and a major role in planning or committee work

Key selection criteria

Essential criteria

- 1. A Ph.D. in Political Science or International Relations
- 2. Potential to contribute to the program's international relations undergraduate and postgraduate curriculum
- 3. Demonstrated history of excellence in teaching through documented teaching evaluations by peers and/or students
- 4. Potential for a strong record of achievement in research in International Relations, including publications and competitive grant applications
- 5. Potential to supervise postgraduate research students, including Higher Degree by Research
- 6. Demonstrated capacity to work constructively and collaboratively with colleagues
