Primary Purpose:

In accordance with organisational policies and the professional code of conduct of the Psychology Board of Australia, the Psychologist - Paediatrics:

- Provides a psychological service, including evidence-based assessments and therapeutic interventions, to paediatric patients of the Royal Hobart Hospital (RHH), including inpatient and outpatient services.
- Actively collaborate with the child/young person and their parents and/or carers and other members of the
 multi/interdisciplinary team to assist in the coordination of services, service development and develop and
 maintain relationships with key clinical stakeholders.
- Where applicable, act as a regional and statewide resource for skills, knowledge and expertise in the specified area of paediatric psychology.

Duties:

- I. Provide psychological input to paediatric patients attending the RHH (both inpatient and outpatient services), including but not limited to, assessments of mental health, cognition, development and behaviour, and provide interventions where appropriate (both group and individual).
- 2. Prepare psychological/neuropsychological reports, including medico-legal reports as required.
- 3. Engage with and provide advice and consultation to multidisciplinary teams as required, including assisting multidisciplinary teams in discharge planning, multidisciplinary case conferences and family meetings.
- 4. Provide education and support to parents, family, carers, staff, schools, service providers and others involved in the ongoing care, support and management of the patient.
- 5. Provide consultancy and peer consultation to other psychologists, and supervision to post-graduate students as negotiated and agreed with the Manager Psychology Services.
- 6. Participate in registered quality improvement and research projects as agreed with the Manager Psychology Services.
- 7. Actively pursue contemporary professional knowledge and its application to the paediatric psychology setting through appropriate continuing professional development.
- 8. Maintain records of clinical and non-clinical activity in accordance with policy and procedures for Psychology Services, RHH.
- 9. Actively participate in and contribute to the organisation's Quality & Safety and Work Health & Safety processes, including in the development and implementation of safety systems, improvement initiatives, safeguarding practices for vulnerable people, and related training.
- 10. The incumbent can expect to be allocated duties, not specifically mentioned in this document, that are within the capacity, qualifications and experience normally expected from persons occupying positions at this classification level.



Key Accountabilities and Responsibilities:

Under professional supervision, general guidance and support provided by the Manager Psychology Services, the Psychologist - Paediatrics is expected to:

- Exercise high level initiative and professional judgement whilst undertaking complex and critical professional work in a hospital setting (inpatient and outpatient) requiring a demonstrated commitment to the provision of a high standard of patient care.
- Work within Agency policies and procedures and comply with the registration and ethical standards of the Psychology Board of Australia.
- Recognise and maintain one's own continuing professional development, peer consultation and registration as a Psychologist, according to the requirements of the Psychology Board of Australia.
- Champion a child safe culture that upholds the National Principles for Child Safe Organisations. The Department is committed to the safety, wellbeing, and empowerment of all children and young people, and expect all employees to actively participate in and contribute to our rights-based approach to care, including meeting all mandatory reporting obligations.
- Where applicable, exercise delegations in accordance with a range of Acts, Regulations, Awards, administrative authorities and functional arrangements as mandated by Statutory office holders including the Secretary and Head of State Service. The relevant Unit Manager can provide details to the occupant of delegations applicable to this position.
- Comply at all times with policy and protocol requirements, including those relating to mandatory education, training and assessment.

Pre-employment Conditions:

- I. Extensive experience in, and knowledge of, contemporary Clinical Psychological and/or Neuropsychological practice in paediatric and adolescent settings (inpatient and/or outpatient) which includes evidence-based assessments and therapeutic interventions.
- 2. High level interpersonal, negotiation and conflict resolution skills including demonstrated experience in liaising effectively with family and support networks, clinicians and health professionals.
- 3. Effective verbal and written communication skills and demonstrated experience in the provision of education, supervision/peer consultation and high level formal documentation, including medico-legal and Guardianship and Administration Board reports.
- 4. Proven ability to work effectively both independently and as a collaborative member of a multidisciplinary team.
- 5. Demonstrated ability to apply independent judgement, adaptability and flexibility whilst working within a complex environment subject to change.
- 6. Proven commitment to Quality Improvement, research and ongoing professional development.
