
University governance and management

The University of Western Australia was founded in 1911 by the pioneers of a fledgling capital city on Australia's west coast with a vision to create its own world class university to educate its students and to also solve practical problems. The mission - to advance the prosperity and welfare of the people.

Our founders believed that a university should not serve a narrow elite interest group within society, but serve society as a whole. The University of Western Australia, now ranked among the World's leading 100 universities, is proud of the role it has played over generations to support the growth, development and prosperity of our state, nation and region.

The geopolitical focus of the world is shifting towards the Indo-Pacific. The influence and importance of our Indian Ocean neighbours is increasing. Many of these countries are also grappling on a day-to-day basis with issues relevant to UWA's research strengths such as energy, agriculture, health, governance and economic development.


The aims of the institute include:

- Running short course programs for current and future business, government and NGO leaders in WA, Australia, the Indian Ocean region and the Indo-Pacific.

Role, key responsibilities and selection criteria

Role

The Director of the UWA Public Policy Institute will report directly to the Vice-Chancellor and will be responsible for providing direction and co-ordination of the UWA Public Policy Institute, working with key partners internally and externally to maximise the translation of UWA research into policy impact. This will involve creating opportunities for UWA research to have an impact on policy; strengthening capacity in policy engagement across the faculties; and ensuring that the University's planning and strategic thinking takes into account and facilitates policy impact more broadly.





Key responsibilities

External Engagement

- Facilitate and promote the engagement of UWA and identified partner institutions' academics with policy makers, including through meetings, workshops, conferences, publications and social media;
- Understand and influence the external environment in which the Institute operates; promote the Institute and its activities (regionally, nationally and internationally);
- Develop and promote appropriate domestic and international networks, partnerships and alliances.

UWA Public Policy Institute Internal

- Work with the UWA Public Policy Institute's Advisory Board and leadership team, to provide clear vision and leadership to guide the Institute's activities;
- Develop, implement and monitor annual and medium-term goals to achieve the University's goal of maximising the policy impact of its research and other activities, together with programmes and initiatives to meet this goal;
- Lead actively in developing and maintaining a diverse and inclusive workforce and respectful workplace culture.

University

- Create and facilitate networks of academics with interest in particular policy issues, with the goal of maximising the policy impact of their work;
- Ensure the Institute's strategic plan is determined in a collegial and consultative way that involves all staff and students associated with the Institute having the opportunity to be heard;
- Ensure that the Institute delivers appropriate training to assist academics in engaging in policy work;
- Work effectively with the members of the University Executive and other senior leaders to ensure their active involvement in public policy activities and meaningful cross-University engagement with the Institute.

Selection criteria

- Experience of working in a similar context, preferably experience of: international diplomacy; policy work with the academic community and stakeholders such as government, businesses or NGOs; and broad Indo-Pacific expertise is desirable;
- Leadership and clear vision: the ability to articulate and secure commitment to that vision; to initiate and manage change; to earn credibility; to inspire colleagues; to maintain positive and productive relationships;
- Superior interpersonal, communication, advocacy and negotiation skills, demonstrating an ability to influence others to achieve strategic objectives;
- Intellect, creativity and judgement: demonstrated original ideas; creative approach; sound judgement, including personal insight; capacity to encourage ideas, initiative and innovation in others;
- Strategic thinking and planning: capacity to define and articulate strategy, priorities and imperatives; to understand strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, threats;
- Political awareness: the ability to take account of all stakeholder requirements; and to influence, network, understand and operate effectively within different 'political' environments.

Conditions of employment

This position is being offered initially for a three year period.

An attractive and flexibly constructed remuneration package will be negotiated on the basis of the total cost to the University and will include:

- Employer contribution to superannuation of 17%;
- Recreation leave of 20 working days per annum;
- Long Service Leave;
- Other benefits.
