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Position Summary

The School of Social and Political Sciences is at the forefront of teaching and research in the social sciences in Australia. The School has a team of dedicated academic and professional staff in the disciplines of Political Science, Criminology, Anthropology and Sociology as well as our allied research centres providing a dynamic and rewarding environment for staff and students. The Lecturer in Public Policy will join a collegial group of scholars in the Political Science discipline. This group brings together experts in Public Policy, Governance, Public Management and International Relations who are situated in a broader interdisciplinary school.

This position is offered as an 'Melbourne Early Career Academic Fellowship' (MECAF) and in this position staff will be expected to engage in a self-directed development programme which will be developed with the support of the staff's supervisor and will include appropriate training, career and professional development opportunities and academic supervision.

The Lecturer in Public Policy will be a committed, engaging teacher and researcher and must be able to teach public management and public policy at the graduate level. The Lecturer will have recognised expertise in public policy, undertake research resulting in quality publications with leading publishers, have an established or developing record of excellence and innovation in teaching, and strong engagement and outreach potential. The successful candidate will be expected to make a significant contribution to the research reputation of the discipline of Political Science in the School of Social and Political Sciences by undertaking research resulting in publications with leading publishers in the field, foster engagement links with external networks/partners nationally and internationally.

The teaching portfolio for this post will focus on the well-established Master of Public Policy and Management which will also include contributions to curriculum development. The incumbent will supervise student research (at honours, graduate coursework and RHD levels), and will take on administrative tasks associated with the appointment.

Due to Australian immigration regulations, we will prefer applicants with Australian work rights. We welcome applications from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

1. Key Responsibilities

A Lecturer (Level B) is expected to make contributions to the teaching effort of the institution and to carry out activities to maintain and develop his/her scholarly, research, and/or professional activities relevant to the profession or discipline. Specific duties include:

1.1 TEACHING

- Preparation and delivery of lectures, tutorials and seminars as appropriate and in line with Faculty of Arts minimum thresholds for teaching satisfaction;
- Initiation, development and review of subject material at the undergraduate, honours and graduate level;
- Subject coordination and curriculum development;
- Administrative tasks associated with the subjects taught, including consultation with students, marking and assessment;
- Supervision of honours and graduate research. In particular, the successful applicant will be expected to supervise an appropriate number of honours, graduate coursework and research higher degree theses as required, and will be expected to ensure the timely completion of their research.

1.2 RESEARCH

- The conduct of research leading to high quality publications, particularly in leading internationally refereed journals and with leading book publishers in line with the Faculty of Arts minimum expectations;
- Development of applications for competitive research funding;
- Participation in the research activities of the discipline;
- Supervise research higher degree students.

1.3 ENGAGEMENT

- Engagement with external stakeholders including building external networks, partnerships and consultancies;
- Involvement in professional activity, including participation in meetings of professional societies.

1.4 SERVICE TO THE DISCIPLINE & SCHOOL

- Involvement in professional activity, including participation in meetings of professional societies;
- Engagement with external stakeholders including building external networks, partnerships and consultancies;
- Meetings and committee work within the School and the wider university community, as appropriate;

2. Selection Criteria

2.1 ESSENTIAL

- A completed (or submitted with proof of favourable examination) PhD in public management, public policy, political science or a closely related discipline. To be eligible for this MECAF position *you must have completed your PhD no more than 3 years ago.* This period can be extended by an additional 2 years due to career interruptions for example illness, carer's leave, international postings, non-research employment or maternity leave;
- A strong record of research and scholarly publication in public management or public policy with a developing publication profile;
- Demonstrated excellence in teaching graduate subjects, including curriculum development, subject design and delivery. Experience in teaching innovation and team teaching will be valued;
- Demonstrated capacity for high quality teaching in public management and public policy;
- Capacity to supervise honours and graduate coursework degree theses and to participate in supervisory panels at the RHD level;

- Capacity to attract research grants and consultancies;
- Demonstrated ability to deal efficiently with administrative tasks relevant to the position and to work collegially with professional and academic staff;
- The selected person must be able to start by July 1, 2019.

2.2 DESIRABLE

- Strong computer literacy in line with the University's commitment to e-teaching and elearning;
- Capacity to build local and/or international networks and partnerships, foster or support industry partnerships or sectoral engagement.

3. Special Requirements

All candidates who have previously held a permanent/continuing academic position are ineligible to apply.
