ROLE CONTEXT

Primary Objective(s) of role:

Employees classified at this level provide clinical nursing expertise for specified individual patients/ clients and populations, and provide clinical leadership in an area of practice, and may work in a variety of clinical settings. Employees classified at this level are experts within their area and stream of practice and have a significant degree of autonomy and decision making. The Nurse Consultant HIV Liaison provides nursing care to clients living with HIV who are linked to CALHN Infectious Diseases Unit, including those newly diagnosed with HIV and those who are long standing people living with HIV (PLHIV). The Nurse Consultant provides expert care coordination and case management to clients living with HIV who have difficulty managing their chronic illness independently. The role provides support and education to inpatient clinical teams caring for PLHIV who may be hospitalised for varied reasons, enduring adherence to medicines to optimise treatment goals.

Various practice models may be used to enact this role, including but not limited to:

- Primarily providing direct nursing care, case management and care coordination;
- Providing clinical education and leadership to nurses/ midwives to enable them to provide quality care;

Employees in this role accept accountability for their nursing practice, the outcomes of nursing practices for the specific patient/client group, the professional advice given, delegations of care made and for addressing inconsistencies between practice and policy.

Internal

- Maintains close collaborative working relationships with all level 3 and level 4 Nurses across the Infectious Diseases services to provide coordinated care for clients living with HIV who may have other care needs.
- > Maintains cooperative and productive working relationships within all members of the health care team including active participation in multi-disciplinary complex care reviews, taking the lead role in care coordination of the most complex patients within the service.
- > Supports and works collaboratively with less experienced members of the nursing/ midwifery team.

External

Maintains effective and collaborative working relationships with non-government organisations or other government organisations/agencies who provide services to clients living with HIV to optimise care coordination and positive client outcomes [These may include but not limited to: Royal District Nursing Service, SA Dental Service, MOSAIC Counselling, SA Prison Health Service, SAMESH, GPs caring for people living with HIV, Aboriginal Controlled Health Services].

Major challenges currently associated with the role include:

- > Keeping professionally up to date with relevant research, technological advances and models of care and adapting current ways of working to incorporate new contemporary evidence.
- > Working appropriately and in a culturally respectful way with youth, women and their families where there may be multiple complexities, diverse cultural backgrounds and expectations of clients.
- > Accepting responsibility for the maintenance of own knowledge and professional competence and contemporary practices.
- Working collaboratively within the multidisciplinary team and across organisational programs/sites and promotes communication processes to enable best client outcomes.

Organisational Context

Organisational Overview:

Our mission at SA Health is to lead and deliver a comprehensive and sustainable health system that aims to ensure healthier, longer and better lives for all South Australians. SA Health Challenges:

The health system is facing the challenges of an ageing population, increased incidence of chronic disease, workforce shortages, and ageing infrastructure. The SA Health Care Plan has been developed to meet these challenges and ensure South Australian's have access to the best available health care in hospitals, health care centres and through GPs and other providers.

Central Adelaide Local Health Network:

CALHN is one of five Local Health Networks (LHNs) in South Australia established in July 2011. CALHN is responsible for the following health services:

- · Royal Adelaide Hospital (RAH)
- The Queen Elizabeth Hospital (TQEH)
- Hampstead Rehabilitation Centre (HRC)
- Repatriation Health Precinct
- Glenside Health Service (GHS) Psychiatric Intensive Care Unit; Inpatient Rehabilitation Services and Acute beds only
- Adelaide Dental Hospital (ADH).

CALHN also has governance over numerous community mental health and primary health services including Prison Health Service, SA Dental Service and DonateLife SA. Of note also is governance of the Statewide Clinical Support Services (SCSS) including Imaging, Pathology and Pharmacy, responsibility of which has vacillated between CALHN and DHW over the past few years.

CALHN is one of three metropolitan LHNs and its core population is approximately 390,000 people. CALHN also provides services to patients from other SA networks, rural and remote areas, the Northern Territory, NSW (Broken Hill) and western parts of Victoria. These services usually relate to complex services such as head and neck cancer, radiation therapy, cardiac surgery, spinal surgery or rehabilitation.

CALHN's purpose is to deliver quality and sustainable healthcare. While the delivery of high quality patient care is our number one priority, we face a significant challenge in achieving financial sustainability. A quality-assured financial recovery plan has been developed to meet these challenges.

The Infectious Diseases Unit provides inpatient, outpatient and ambulatory services for patients who have been diagnosed with, or who are at risk of, an infectious disease. The service provides state-wide specialist support for people living outside the CALHN catchment. The Infectious Diseases workforce is committed to, and guided by the CALHN Vision, mission and values, and strategic ambition.
