Confidentiality

Guidelines for applicants

To be eligible to access Tasmanian Government Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander programs and services, you must be an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander person. This means you must:

- I. have Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander ancestry;
- 2. self-identify as an Aboriginal person and/or Torres Strait Islander; and
- 3. be recognised as an Aboriginal person and/or Torres Strait Islander by the Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander community in which you live or have lived.

Tasmanian Government agencies require you to complete this form to determine your eligibility for:

- Tasmanian Government Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander specific programs and services; and
- representation on Tasmanian Government committees, boards and groups where the person is required to be an Aboriginal person or Torres Strait Islander.

The form includes:

- a statutory declaration (page 2); and
- a confirmation statement from an Aboriginal organisation (page 3).

A statutory declaration is a legal document, and making a false declaration is a criminal offence.

The confirmation statement must be completed by a registered Aboriginal organisation governed by a board or committee predominately comprising Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people whose primary purpose is to support Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people.

Personal information will be collected, managed and used by Tasmanian Government agencies, in accordance with the *Personal Information Protection Act 2004*, for the purpose of determining your eligibility to access Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander specific programs and services delivered by the Tasmanian Government.

Statutory Declaration

Making a false statement in a statutory declaration is a crime punishable under section 113 of the *Criminal Code Act 1924*. The maximum penalty under the Criminal Code is 21 years imprisonment.

Confirmation from an Aboriginal organisation

You must provide a statement that you are accepted as an Aboriginal person and/or Torres Strait Islander from an Aboriginal organisation. This statement can be provided by a registered organisation governed by a board or committee predominately comprising Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people whose primary purpose is to support Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people¹.

Organisations can complete the Confirmation Statement below, or provide one of the following stating you are accepted as an Aboriginal person and/or Torres Strait Islander by the community in which you live, or have lived:

- A letter or fax, on an organisation's letterhead and signed by an authorised person²;
- An email, from an organisation's email address and completed by an authorised person; or
- A certificate from an Aboriginal organisation, signed by an authorised person.

The statement should show your full name and the signing organisation, as well as:

- your date of birth and your address; and
- the name, signature and position of the representative(s) signing the statement and the date it was signed.

¹ If the organisation providing your confirmation has not previously been accepted by the Tasmanian Government for the purpose of confirming eligibility under the Eligibility Policy, the Department of Communities Tasmania may apply criteria to consider whether the organisation can be accepted under the Policy.

² Participating organisations determine who is an authorised person.
