
The key activities of Three Rivers DRH are:

Position overview

The Lecturer in First Nations Rural Health (Clinical Educator) will be a key staff member in the Three Rivers Department of Rural Health developing quality rural clinical training experiences for health professional students within First Nations health settings across the UDRH footprint, whilst also conducting research that impacts on the health of rural First Nations people.

The Lecturer in First Nations Rural Health (Clinical Educator) will engage in activities related to developing clinical placement opportunities as well as teaching and supporting students and clinicians within First Nations health settings. They will also undertake stakeholder engagement with First Nations health service providers, clinicians, faculties and schools within Charles Sturt (and other universities) to promote the objectives of the UDRH, whilst also developing capacity for quality clinical training in existing and new settings.

Principal responsibilities

- Apply learning and teaching methodologies, processes, technologies and tools to deliver high
 quality student-centred learning opportunities in multiple First Nations health settings. Learning
 and teaching will be conducted within and across disciplines and as required to meet the teaching
 needs of the UDRH. Excellence in teaching will be achieved across a range of delivery modes,
 which may include face to face, clinical education and online teaching and assessment.
- Provide leadership and foster partnerships with First Nations health clinicians, First Nations service providers and First Nations community stakeholders to build opportunities for supported student placements within the Three Rivers footprint.
- Apply specialist knowledge of First Nations health and/or education to build strong professional relationships with staff, students and communities to achieve the goals of the UDRH program and provide support and learning opportunities to maximise placement experiences across a range of First Nations health settings.
- Develop, lead and/or evaluate continuing professional education to build service delivery capacity within First Nations health settings, whilst maintaining individual professional accreditation.
- Actively collaborate with Three Rivers UDRH teams to design, deliver and continually improve course content and learning experiences for students, with a focus on developing student's cultural intelligence and preparedness for placement within First Nations health and rural placement settings.
- Conduct ethical, high quality research and contribute to knowledge through scholarship, publication and presentation, with a focus on the health of First Nations people in rural Australia.

- Provide cultural peer support to other UDRH staff, whilst actively contributing to Three Rivers UDRH and Charles Sturt cultural activities.
- Actively contribute to the governance, marketing, promotion, and administrative activities to facilitate the work of the UDRH.
- Other duties appropriate to the classification as required.

Selection criteria

Applicants are expected to address the selection criteria when applying for this position.

Essential

- A. Identify as an Indigenous Australian with a thorough understanding of First Nations cultures and societies and demonstrated ability to communicate sensitively and effectively within this environment.
- B. A doctoral or masters qualification appropriate to a relevant allied health discipline (or equivalent clinical experience, accreditation and standing), and evidence of the delivery of high quality student centred learning and teaching.
- C. Sound knowledge and understanding of the discipline gained through industry experience and/or scholarly activities or similar, including a record of research/creative works or professional activity relevant to the discipline.
- D. Demonstrated high level analytical, critical thinking and problem-solving skills along with written and oral communication and interpersonal skills.
- E. Demonstrated ability to build strong partnerships, networks and relationships to achieve professional and team objectives.
- F. Current registration as a health care professional.
