- Track record of high quality research publications and/or creative works in a relevant area or areas.
- Evidence of an inspirational leadership style which promotes a culture of high performance engagement and commitment.
- Demonstrated ability to forge meaningful external relationships and represent the School, Faculty and the University locally, nationally and internationally, to community, industry and other academic institutions and partners.
- Proven track record in successful national competitive grant funding.
- A demonstrated ability to contribute successfully to Higher Degree programs through teaching, supervision and administration at these levels.
- Proven involvement in undergraduate and/or postgraduate curriculum development and professional leadership within the education sector.
- The ability to provide strategic and administrative leadership in research, teaching and scholarship, and to contribute to the dynamic creation of an academic environment for collaboration and professional sharing.
