ROLE CONTEXT

Primary Objective(s) of role:

- Provide expert public health engineering, scientific and technical information on issues of a highly complex nature relating to public and environmental health matters regarding wastewater and recycled water management.
- > With limited or no supervision, evaluate and approve applications for the installation and management of complex and novel wastewater systems and recycled water schemes including ongoing compliance, monitoring and enforcement.
- > With limited or no direction, administer legislation and prescribed codes, protocols, guidelines and public health policy programs and initiatives relating to wastewater and recycled water management.
- > Prepare cabinet submissions and policy documentation as required.
- > Provision of internal advice, preparation of briefings and corporate correspondence.
- > Provide representation on national and State committees and forums.
- > In consultation with the Manager, Wastewater, exercise Delegated Authority from the Minister to approve nominated work.
- > Develop new programs and initiatives to ensure legislative and functional activities are directed toward achievement of Branch objectives.
- > Contribute to the well-being of people in South Australia through undertaking rostered on-call work, incident management and participation in emergency management response.

Exercise delegated authority in approving wastewater systems in consultation with the Manager, Wastewater Management section. Implement enforcement policies developed to fulfil the statutory obligations under legislation administered by the Service. Undertake compliance and monitoring of wastewater systems and recycled water schemes.
Contribution to service delivery and emergency management activities	 Undertake rostered on-call work and provide incident management services. Provision of internal advice, preparation of briefings and corporate correspondence. Educational/Vocational Qualifications

> Must hold an appropriate tertiary degree in environmental health, wastewater/water-related science or environmental engineering field.

- > Must have a well-developed ability to complete projects independently with limited supervision and ability to lead a task-oriented team and or work as a team member, and as an individual public health engineer/scientist.
- > Produce work of a high standard with a proven ability to take a practical and innovative approach to solving complex public and environmental health problems.
- > Advanced skills in verbal and written communication with a proven ability to engage and effectively communicate with relevant stakeholders such as other regulatory agencies, consultants, government authorities, industry, private companies and individuals.
- > Ability to plan and schedule work activities and meet deadlines with limited or no supervision.
- > Possess well-developed research, evaluation, investigation and reporting skills with a demonstrated ability to assess innovation and new technology.
- > Demonstrated ability to develop new initiatives, programs and prepare technical, legislative and/or advisory code/guideline publications.
- > Demonstrated ability to communicate, motivate, support and educate other staff and relevant stakeholders on aspects of public and environmental health.

Experience

- Sophisticated level of public health engineering/scientific experience involving wastewater and recycle water and or wastewater microbiology/chemistry investigations and in the design and performance of wastewater collection, treatment and re-use or disposal systems in accordance with recognised engineering and scientific principles.
- > Demonstrated experience in the evaluation, assessment and preparation of complex and technical written reports relating to wastewater and recycled water management.
- > Experience in the principles of design and performance of wastewater and recycled water systems.

Knowledge

- > A high level of knowledge and understanding of wastewater and recycled water systems, and of the principles involved in the design, treatment, construction and installation processes of those systems.

> Post graduate qualifications in environmental health, environmental engineering or science applicable to wastewater management.

Proven ability to remain flexible and adaptable in a changing management environment with a demonstrated willingness to accept responsibility and commitment to progressive development of knowledge and skills relevant to public and environmental health.

Experience

- > High level of experience in the investigation and assessment of and reporting on the technical engineering/scientific aspects on the suitability of the design and/or operation of wastewater systems for the collection, treatment, disposal of wastewater and bio-solids, the re-use of reclaimed water and biosolids and or the prevention of public and environmental health pollution
- > Experience in assessment and management of exposure to hazards from wastes and wastewater systems.
- > Experience in legislation, policy and guideline development.

Knowledge

Sound knowledge of government policies and procedures, including methods for the investigation of public and environmental health problems and the assessment of strategies designed to minimise such problems.

Special Conditions:

- It is mandatory that no person, whether or not currently working in SA Health, will be eligible for appointment to a position in SA Health unless they have obtained a satisfactory Criminal and Relevant History Screening.
- Prescribed Positions under the Children's Protection Act (1993) must obtain a satisfactory Criminal and Relevant History 'child-related' employment screening through the Screening and Licensing Unit, Department for Communities and Social Inclusion.
- Criminal and Relevant History Screening must be renewed every 3 years thereafter from date of issue for 'Prescribed Positions' under the *Children's Protection Act 1993* or 'Approved Aged Care Provider Positions' as defined under the *Accountability Principles 2014* pursuant to the *Aged Care Act 2007* (Cth).
- > Appointment is subject to immunisation risk category requirements. There may be ongoing immunisation requirements that must be met.
- Depending on work requirements the incumbent may be transferred to other locations across SA Health to perform work appropriate to classification, skills and capabilities either on a permanent or temporary basis subject to relevant provisions of the *Public Sector Act 2009* for Public Sector employees or the SA Health (Health Care Act) Human Resources Manual for Health Care Act employees.
- > The incumbent may be required to participate in Counter Disaster activities including attendance, as required, at training programs and exercises to develop the necessary skills required to participate in responses in the event of a disaster and/or major incident.
- > A driver's licence (class car) is essential.

General Requirements:

- > Relevant Awards, Enterprise Agreements, Public Sector Act 2009, Health Care Act 2008 and the SA Health (Health Care Act) Human Resources Manual.
